In this issue we include some papers from another successful Australian Association of Social Work and Welfare Educators (AASWWE) Symposium held in Perth in October 2013 where the conference theme was "Imagining Futures for Social Work Education and Research".

In this issue we feature six thought-provoking articles and four book reviews.

In the first article Margot Rawsthorne reports on the evaluation of a peer mentor program informed by Indigenous community development and empowerment principles. The article argues for stronger support for Aboriginal women to live free of violence.
